May of 2017, It's back to school and I like all the other students was on my way to school, well aware that I just did the previous end of term exams out of mercy of the deputy principal.

The arrears have already started stacking and this is just my first year. Luckily I am allowed to school but with a stern warning that those who have not paid at least 50% of the fee will be sent home that coming weekend, and there I was not having touched a cent.

It is not out of ignorance or defiance but out of circumstance and lack.

I've faced my fair share of challenges. My parents struggled to support my brothers and me through our educational journey. My mother worked as a customer assistant at a wholesaler, while my father took on casual manual labor jobs. Their combined income barely covered rent and food, let alone our school fees.

Though I struggled during my primary education, I performed well on my Kenya Certificate of Primary Education (KCPE) exams. However, my certificates were withheld by the school due to arrears.

Immediately after completing KCPE, hoping to pay off at least half of my arrears, I started working casual jobs. After months of effort, the primary school headteacher agreed to release my certificates on the basis that I was the first student from the school to achieve such results.

I secured a spot at Kahuho Uhuru High School, where my secondary education began. But the struggles only intensified. During the first term, I was among the top-performing students. By the second term, I returned to school without having cleared the first term's fee balance.



That same term I was asked to apply for a scholarship at KSF International by the school liaison. Luckily, I was awarded the scholarship and since then my academic journey took a different trajectory. KSF International paid my academic fees up until my final year. Their financial help gave me assurance of education helping me try and be my self-best, academically.

I then graduated from Kahuho Uhuru High School in 2021 with an A- average and was able to secure a spot at Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology to pursue B.Sc Electrical & Electronics Engineering. Even today, as I still pursue my degree and volunteering with KSF, KSF continues to support me in very many ways and I forever will be grateful to all partners and volunteers at KSF especially Mrs. Alice Hastings-James.

I am close to achieving my dreams and KSF made them within reach.

Preventive Mental Health Awareness Graduation

From October 8th to 23rd, Beyond the Vision Initiative (BVI), in co-partnership with HNA Mental Health Awareness Inc, (Hakeem's Space) marked the graduation of 647 learners from 8 local institutions and 34 teachers from its two-year preventive mental health education program through school-based workshops.

This program is aimed at help participants journey toward becoming effective self helpers and support others facing mental health challenges.

The key partners for the program who are school patrons were recognized for their dedicated support in ensuring the sessions went on successfully and in creating a favourable environment safe for learning.

Each participant was awarded with a certificate of completion and a branded t-shirt, for the learners to symbolize their journey, and for the teachers symbolizing their vital role in supporting the learners throughout the two-year program.

The ceremonies were rich with emotion as learners shared heartfelt testimonials, reflecting on how the sessions helped them manage emotions, make healthier choices, and support peers in need. One student remarked, “I’ve learned to deal with my problems without hurting myself or others,” capturing the quiet yet profound transformation taking place across the schools.
